PASTOR IN CUMBERLAND

Father Seelos was just 38 years old when he arrived in Cumberland, Maryland. Besides being rector and professor in the seminary, he acted as pastor of the German congregation in the town. As parishes go, it was small, having only three hundred communicants.

With characteristic energy, he threw himself into pastoral work. At first, however, he refrained from much preaching because of the malady in his throat. He was much in evidence in hearing confessions and teaching religion to the children. He saw to the material needs of the church buildings and that the festivals of the Church were carried out in becoming dignity and ceremony.

A rather typical story of his zeal is told. A non-Catholic from Germany had come to settle in the woods surrounding Cumberland. He gained his livelihood by hunting. He spoke only German but he married an English-speaking wife who bore him two children. Without religion himself, he requested baptism for his children from three ministers of religion. They did not respond.

Seelos heard about the case and went to visit the family. The old soldier laid down an ultimatum: the children would be baptized this day or never. Father Seelos countered with: who is going to see that these children are raised Catholic? The man replied that his wife could become a Catholic. Surprisingly, she readily consented to take instructions, while the hunter said he was too old. But faithfully he brought his wife to instructions. Finally after some weeks he too asked to become a Catholic to Seelos' great delight.

FATHER SEELOS WAS A MAN OF PRAYER

The Virtue for November: Prayer

Patron: St. Jude, the Apostle

Text: It behooves us always to pray and never weaken. (Luke 18/1)

Father Seelos was indeed a man of prayer. That's the reason he was so saintly. He had the spirit of prayer. He prayed ceaselessly. If anybody had asked him where he got that great love for prayer, he would have answered: "From my devout, holy mother and father." It developed through the years and finally he was on fire with the love of God. The vocation to the religious life appealed to him because he knew that religious prayed much. He became a Redemptorist because he knew they had a strict order of daily prayer. He loved mental prayer, meditation. He would kneel for a half hour before the Blessed Sacrament, or in his room, and think of God, the things of God, and eternity - repeating "My God I Love You." In his zeal, he wanted everybody in the world to love God. He would make acts of love for all. He would gather the hearts of everybody in the world, put them in all the tabernacles of the world and have them say over and over again, "My God I Love You, I am sorry for having offended you." He would put the tongues of everybody in the world in the sanctuary lamps of the world and make the tongues of fire say from them ceaselessly: "My God I Love You." His meditations were never forced. He did not need a book. His imagination was book enough.

He thanked God that he was a priest because he could say Mass daily. He understood the Mass, the infinite sacrifice of Christ on Calvary, going on continuously in the world. Before his Mass he would say: "Oh, my God, I, a finite, limited, dependent, sinful, proud human being want to give you something infinite! I offer my Mass to give you infinite adoration, (love, praise, glory, honor, blessing), infinite thanksgiving for everything that I have and especially for the great work of my eternal redemption, infinite atonement, satisfaction, reparation for my miserable, hateful sins and for the sins of the world, infinite petition—in Christ, with Christ, through Christ. He had a little book full of petitions. He prayed for himself and he prayed for others. He helped others in an infinite way.

Why can't we be people of prayer? Why can't we have the spirit of prayer and talk with God ceaselessly? We can. Try some of the things above.
