ANNIVERSARY MASS, OCTOBER 5

The 130th anniversary of Father Seeelos' death will be commemorated on the first Sunday of October, the fifth, in St. Mary's Assumption Church at the 11:30 A.M. Mass. Father Joseph Greenwell, C.S.S.R., will be the main celebrant of the Mass and the homilist. Father Greenwell was an associate priest of St. Alphonsus parish some years ago. He is now serving the parish of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Crowley, Louisiana.

The mission cross of Father Seeelos will be available for blessings after the Mass. A reception will be held as usual in the garden of St. Mary's after the ceremonies.

Christina was given a terminal diagnosis after she was born. Then she was given a Father Seelos blessing; and she will be eleven years old on March 17. In June, 1995 Christina was in New Orleans visiting her grandmother; she made a visit to the church and tomb of Father Seelos. I have never seen Christina's smile so bright for so long, nor have I seen her zest for life so pronounced as I did when she was visiting the tomb of Father Seelos on that day. She danced her ballet routine across the front of the altar and over the tomb for at least 20 minutes.

I want to thank all those wonderful people who prayed so hard for me. I want to thank Jack for the prayers and blessings given me in the hospital. All those prayers to God from Father Seelos and my deceased mother, who probably whispered in God's ear "to help save her son." And of course my guardian angel (my wife) who never lost faith.

On entering the hospital (January 18, 1997) to have surgery on two herniated discs, they discovered I had a very high fever and were unable to do the surgery until they found the source of the infection. For six days they ran many tests, including MRI, myelogram, CAT scan, and many other tests and found that I had a staph infection in my blood stream, that turned to osteomyelitis, and then an epidural abscess on my spine.

At the time they gave me a myelogram test they could not get the needle into my spine, and could not understand why. The doctor told me later that if the needle had gone in, it would have spread that poison up my spinal column to my brain, causing meningitis and probable death.

I know all those prayers for me kept that needle from entering my spine and saved my life. The doctor, who is a wonderful man, remarked that I had some divine help.

On April 22, 1997 I started a novena to Father Seelos for my son — a better job and to do God's will. On April 25 an opportunity to purchase a home in his neighborhood presented itself. Now he and his wife are happier with their situation in Baton Rouge. Previously they had been determined not to buy there. I look upon this as an answer to my prayers. They had searched last year and found no home to their liking. It is their attitude that has changed and that to me is a divine intervention. I gave my son my memento.

I also want to report what happened on one January day in 1967. A friend of mine, Marie, had been asked to give a memento of Father Seelos to one Lena for her husband. Marie was being driven to the office by a co-worker when they were hit head-on by someone rushing to work. Their car was totally demolished but neither passenger received a scratch. Marie was holding the memento in her hand. Marie now lives in Houston and she told me the other day that Father Seelos had saved her life. I told her she should have reported it. She said she didn't like to write and gave me permission to do so.
